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## What Does Covenant Enforcement Mean For Heritage Place?

It can be an unpleasant task for the homeowners association (HOA) to enforce rules and regulations. We are so lucky to have such a great community to help us keep our neighborhood beautiful and safe! Unfortunately, the HOA only has a considerable amount of control. Most of the control lies within the Covenant. The rules that are enforced are in the best interest of the entire community. This also means that even if the HOA would like to change a rule, there would have to be majority vote in order to change it. So if you are an interested party in making some changes, it is encouraged to get out and bring your community together to get the votes. For example, some of you have been interested in wrought iron fences being approved. The HOA finds the wrought iron fences to look very nice. However, the Covenant indicates that only wood, stone or brick can be used. The board is always open to hearing your grievances and/or great ideas! If you ever feel that your HOA is not looking out in the best interest of you and the community, please provide your feedback.

## Letter From The President – December 2017

It's that time of year again! Homeowners Association annual dues! They have gone up by the prescribed 3% and will cost each home \$400.82. When compared to other HOA properties this assessment is rather reasonable. But like taxes, one hopes that it is spent carefully and prudently. I think our record on that score remains pretty good.

I'd like to remind everyone of a few important items. If you are having financial problems, the HOA has a payment plan available. You must make arrangements with our agent, AMA, before January 1st, 2018.

The due date for payment is January 1st, 2018, but there is a built in "grace" period of 30 days, which means the money due must be received by AMA by January 31st, 2018. If received on February 1st, 2018, you are late and a late fee applies. Every year someone "bets" that the Postal Service is faster than it really is. They will wait until Monday, January 29th thinking that it will reach AMA's mail slot by the 31st. When they get the late fee notice, we hear the same story, ie, "I put it in the mail in plenty of time to get there!" AMA date stamps every piece of mail they receive; if your payment gets the February 1st stamp, you get a late fee notice.



In spite of my urging, (I write a similar letter every year at this time), if you manage to procrastinate and haven't resolved your issues by March 31st, 2018, be advised, your case is turned over by AMA to a lawyer per our Policies and Procedures. It is then no longer in the hands of the agent, AMA, nor in the hands of your HOA Board. It is in the hands of the lawyers, who are by nature, shark like!

We have had a change in the HOA Board membership. The Secretary, Marcela Sanchez, who was also the Events Coordinator, tendered her resignation, which I accepted with understanding but regret. A big thank you to Marcela for her service to the Heritage Place community. Per our by-laws, I

nominated Sherrie Addante as Marcela's replacement and the Board voted unanimously for Sherrie. Welcome Sherrie to the HOA Board!

I know a lot of people will put up Christmas lights while it is still warm or at least not freezing cold. Just don't turn them on earlier than 6 weeks prior and off again at 4 weeks after. Another light you might check in this season of light is your street lamp. This neighborhood depends on each and every homeowner having an operational light next to the street; our safety and security relies on this.

As this is the December Newsletter, let me wish all of the folks in Heritage Place on behalf of the HOA Board, a Merry Christmas, Happy Hanukah, Happy Kwanza and a Happy New Year!

## Winter is Coming!

Are you ready for the winter season? Here are some tips to prepare your home from any damage that can be caused by snow and dropping temperatures:

- 1 Insulate walls and attics against drafts.
- 2 Caulk and weather-strip doors and windows.
- 3 Replace damaged, loose or missing shingles that may leak during a winter storm.
- 4 Clear your gutters.
- 5 Repair roof leaks and remove tree branches that could get weighed down with ice or snow and fall on your house or your neighbor's.
- 6 Wrap water pipes in your basement and crawl spaces with insulation sleeves to slow heat transfer.
- 7 Turn off exterior faucets as these pipes can burst if they freeze.
- 8 Drain your irrigation system.
- 9 Avoid ice dams - where water from melted snow refreezes in the gutters and seeps in under the roof, soaking interior walls. To avoid ice dams: Ventilate your attic. Insulate the attic floor well to minimize the amount of rising heat. Consider having a water-repellent membrane installed under your roof covering.
- 10 Divert water by adding extensions to downspouts so that water runs at least 3 to 4 feet away from the foundation.
- 11 Tune up your heating system to avoid waiting in line for repairs on a cold day.

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## Control That Holiday Glow

Candles are a popular holiday decoration, but they're also one of the most dangerous. It's important that you follow these precautions to prevent full-blown fires:

- Never leave a lighted candle unattended.
- Always put candles in a metal or ceramic holder. Never place them in combustible containers or ones that can melt.
- Put out candles once they get within two inches of their holders or decorations. This is especially important to follow with natural or plastic decorations that often grace holiday candleholders.
- Never burn candles near things that can catch fire—including Christmas trees and curtains.

Please remember to always keep your dog on a leash while walking in common areas where there are other dogs and people present. 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## **From The Heritage Elementary School Principal**


Dear Heritage Place Homeowner,

Heritage elementary school just completed the fall session of Parent / Teacher Conferences. These conferences occur when the school year is one-third completed. Your neighborhood students are off to an outstanding start! As a school, we have shifted our instructional focus from writing and math to reading and math. The reason for this is that writing has been our focus for the past four years. In this time, teachers have refined their craft and students are writing at high levels. Writing at high levels means that students "think" like authors. Authors recall experiences, share understandings about scientific processes and respond to literature. While making sure grammar and conventions are correct, being an author entails much more. Authors write to connect with their reader. They consider a variety of organizational structures and choose the one that will have the greatest impact on the reader. Authors additionally think through their choice of words, use of metaphors and analogies. They select the organizational structure and elaborate on their ideas so as to have the greatest impact on their reader as possible. Through it all, students share their human experience and communicate life messages based on their lived experience and understanding of the world. As we shift to focusing on reading, our overarching goal is for students to be advanced readers and mathematicians.

In addition to students excelling in academics, many have participated in extracurricular activities. Heritage has a thriving student council. They provide leadership for our outstanding school culture by providing morning announcements, organiz-

ing spirit Fridays and connecting with community organizations to support them. Over ten students participated in CCSD's "Cardboard Challenge". The Cardboard Challenge is part of the Global Cardboard Challenge, an international movement to engage children in creative play. It was inspired by Nirvan Mullick's 2011 short film "Caine's Arcade," about 9-year-old Caine Monroy, who spent his summer vacation building an elaborate cardboard arcade. Additionally, many students participate in one of Heritage's many after school club offerings such as choral music, karate, Lego club, chess club, stock market club, dance club, Battle of the Books, Spelling Bee and running club. One final extracurricular activity that many students participate in is Girl Scout Brownies and Cub Scouts. The Girl Scout Brownies organized "The Teddy Bear Project" whereby organized a school collection of new and gently loved stuff animal drive to benefit the Children Rescue Foundation. Both the Girl Scout Brownies and Cub Scouts contributed to honoring veterans at our recent veteran celebration assembly by presenting and retiring the colors. As the year continues, Heritage students will continue challenging themselves in the classroom and being involved in the school and community.
